

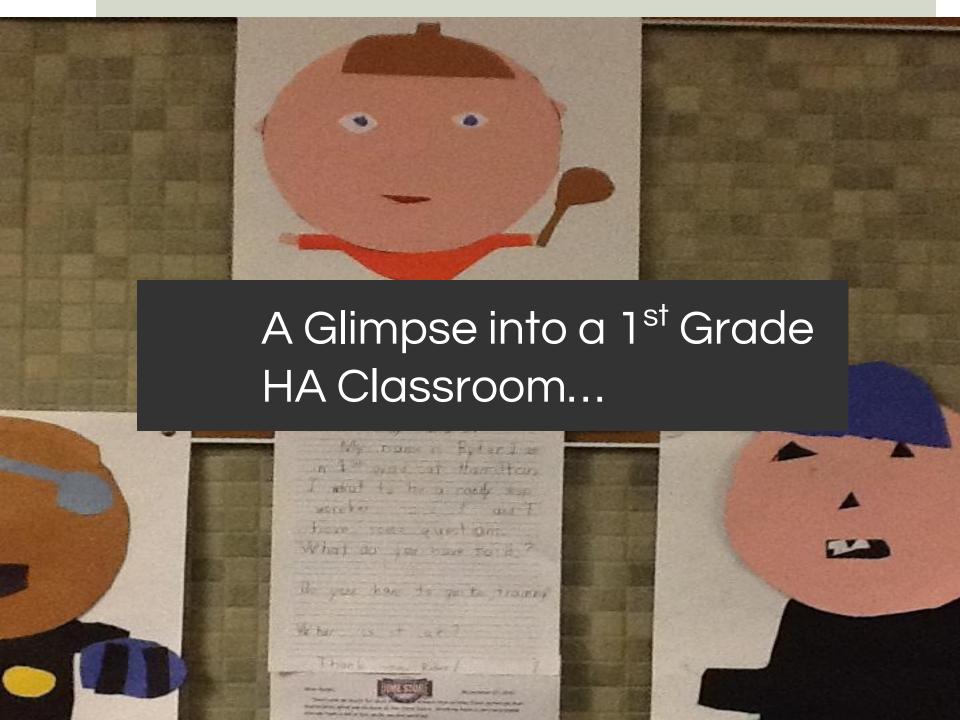

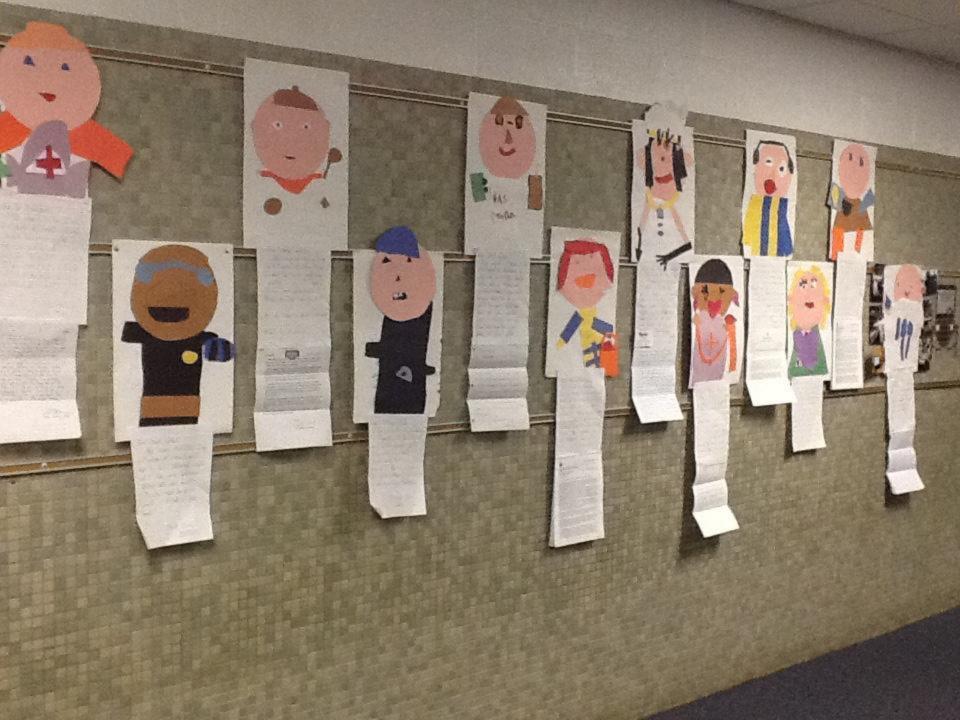

### Small Group **BOOK** Discussion ...

Save the Last Word for Me
Look over chapter 4 or 5; find 4 parts that struck you as particularly IMPORTANT
COPY the quotes on an index card, with the page #s
On the BACK of the cards write WHY you chose that excerpt what about it struck you as important? – what was your CONNECTION?
ORDER your cards, placing the most important on top
Take turns SHARING as follows
Person 1 reads his/her quote
Others comment; Person 1 remains quiet as others comment
After all have commented, Person 1 turns card over 8 shares WHY they chose that quote
Person 2 shares as above
he group picks the <mark>2-3 most central quotes</mark> . Whole group sharing follows

#### Information from AG Conference...

Student Engagement – a function of attention & commitment

| Full Engagement = High attention & high commitment
| Strategic Compliance = High attention & low commitment
| Ritual Compliance = Low attention & low commitment
| Retreatism = No attention & low commitment
| Rebellion = No attention & no commitment

Whatever it would take to move you up the list, would work for kids.
